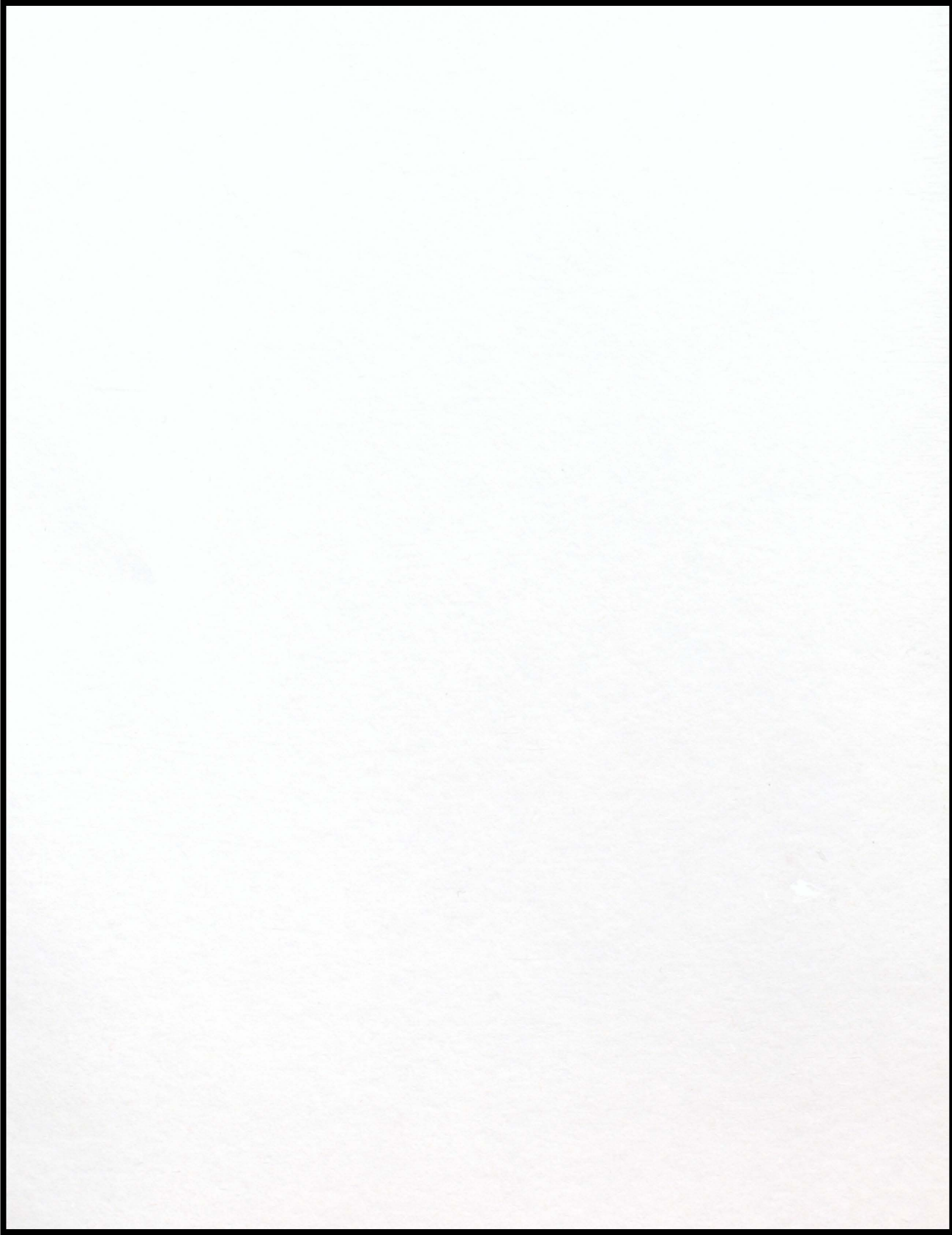



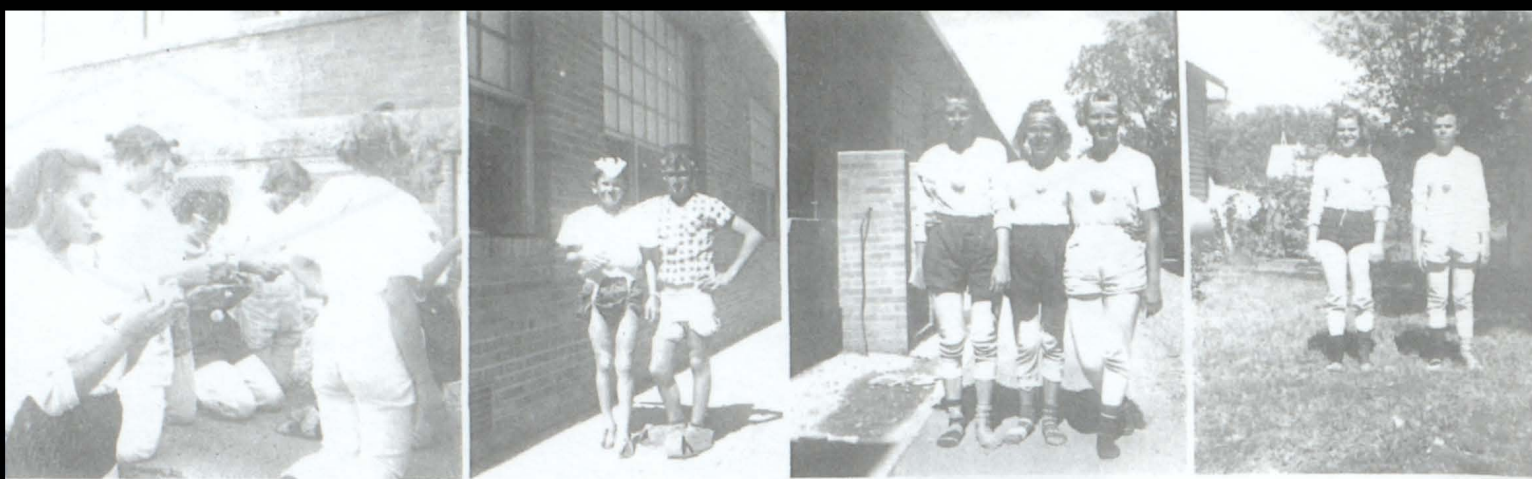
Forward

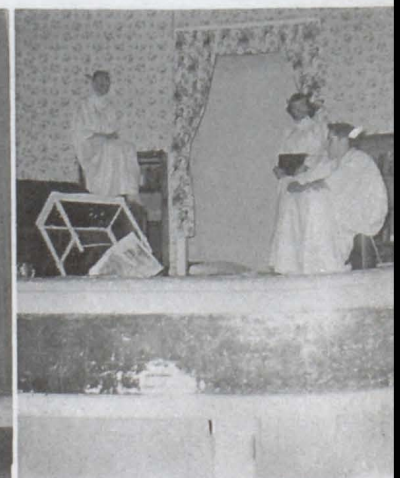

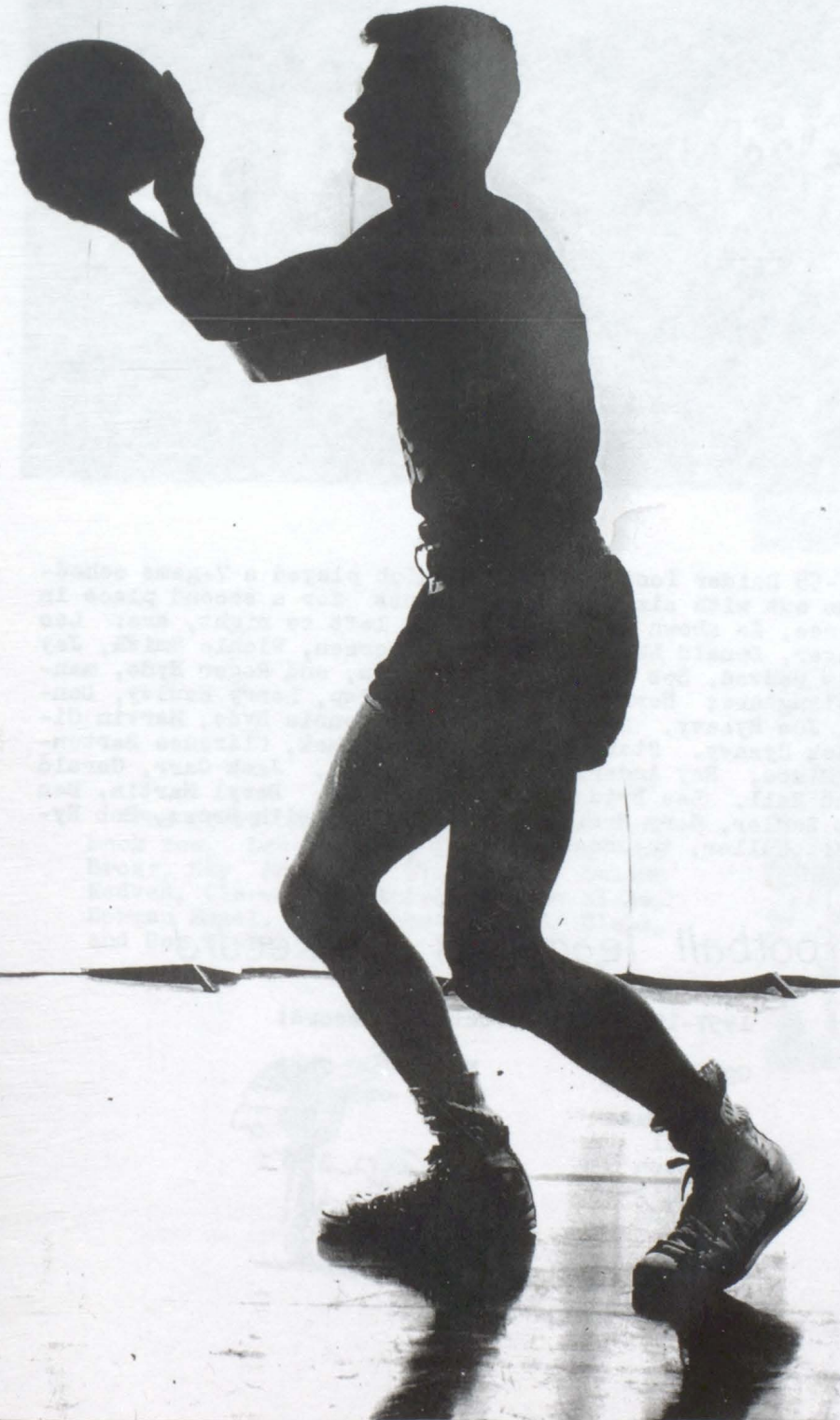

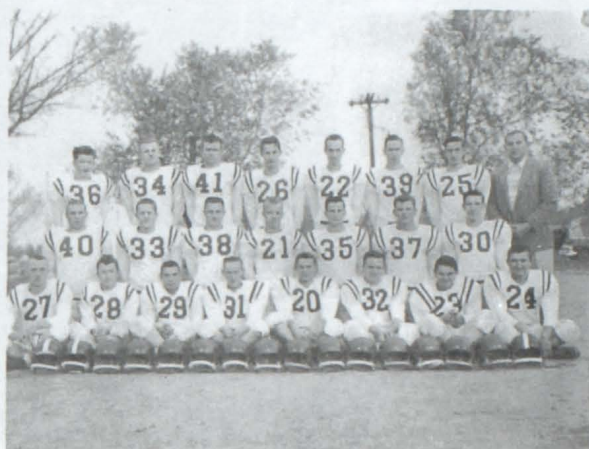

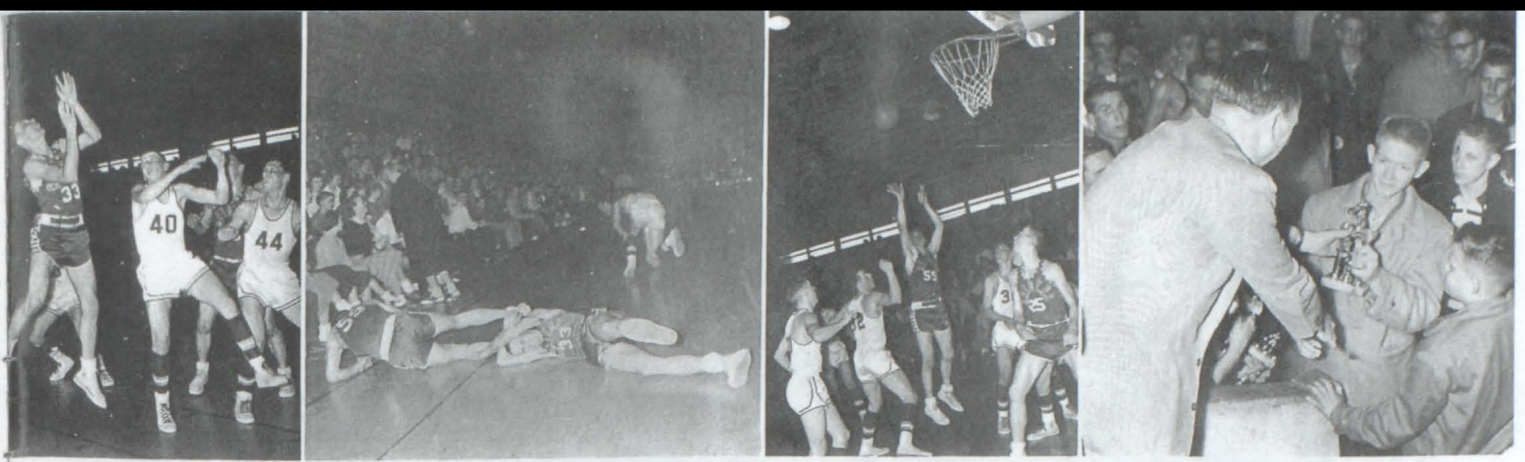

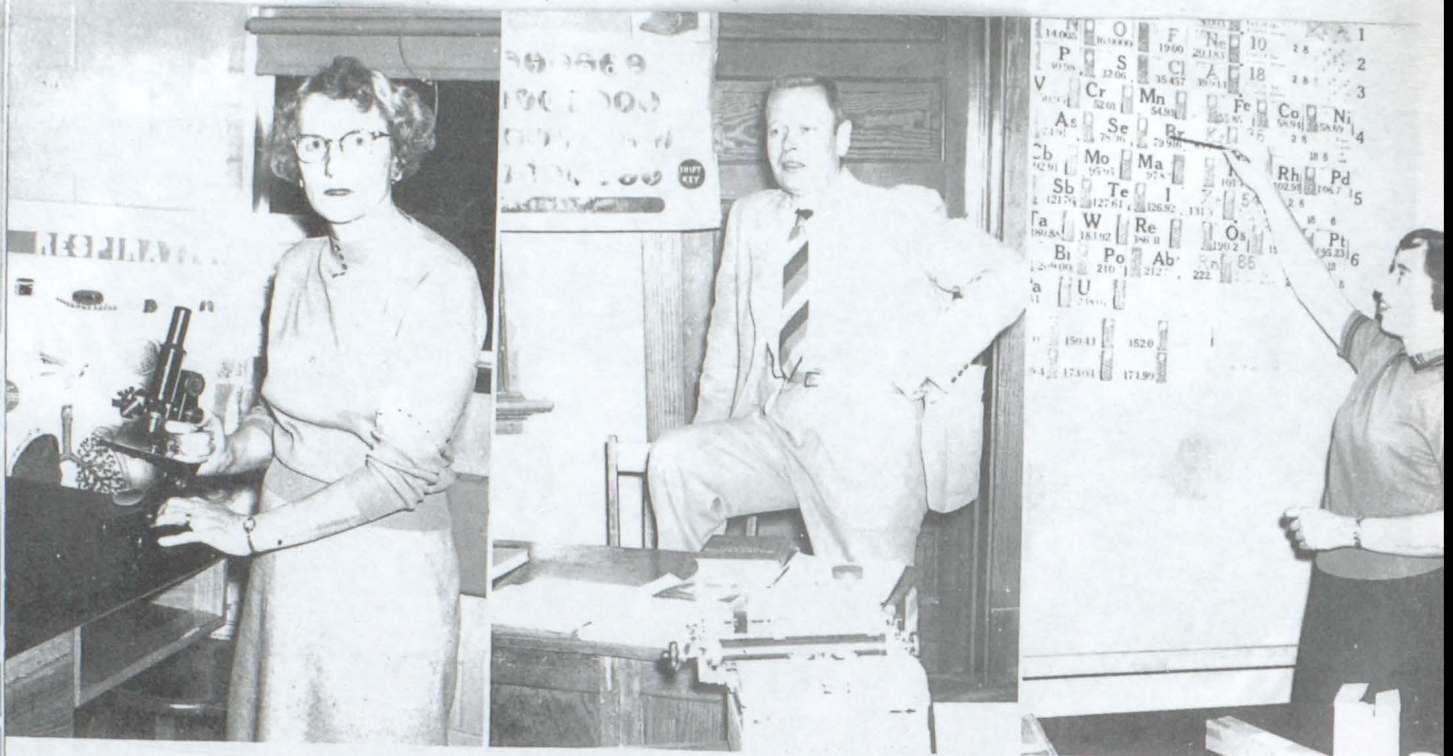

Classes

Classes at Wagner High are big, bigger, and bigger yet... enrollment skyrocketed this year.....eighty-two freshmen registered, making the total enrollment zoom to 210.....the sophomores, juniors, and seniors, whose enrollments are 43, 36, and 44 respectively, make up the remainder of the total enrollment.....these over-sized classes caused crowded classroom conditions throughout the school.....in addition, the grade school enrollment reached an all-time high to further complicate the space problem.

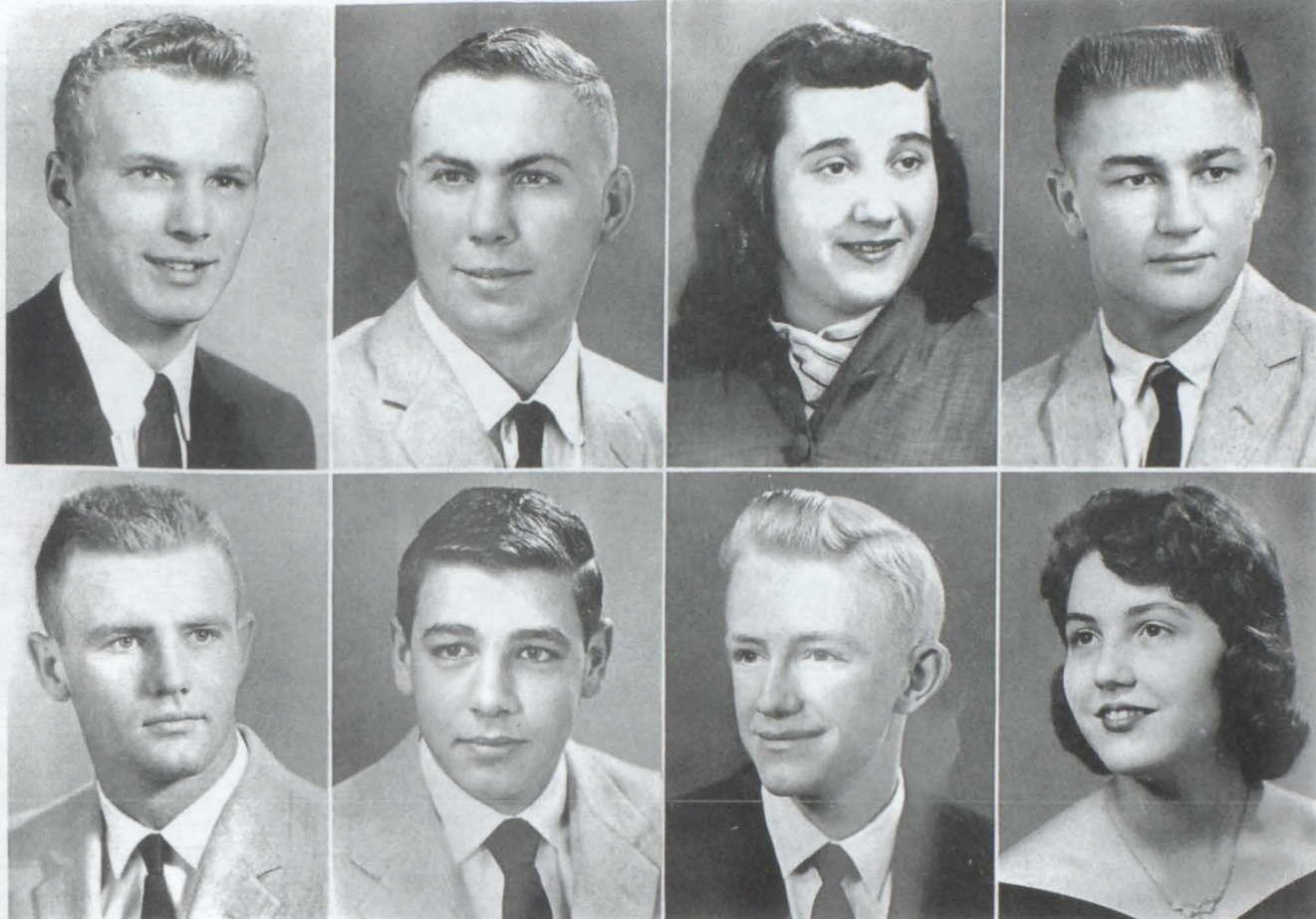

As sophomores, the class was overjoyed when its comic float copped first prize in the annual Homecoming parade. They also remember transferring several classes to the newly constructed school addition that year.

The Junior-Senior Prom and Banquet extravaganza, Evening in Paris, highlighted the class's junior year. Endless bake sales, cake walks, concession stands, and penny-pinching was employed to appropriate the needed funds. Production of the junior class play, "Drums of Death," gave the audience chills and provided profits for the class.

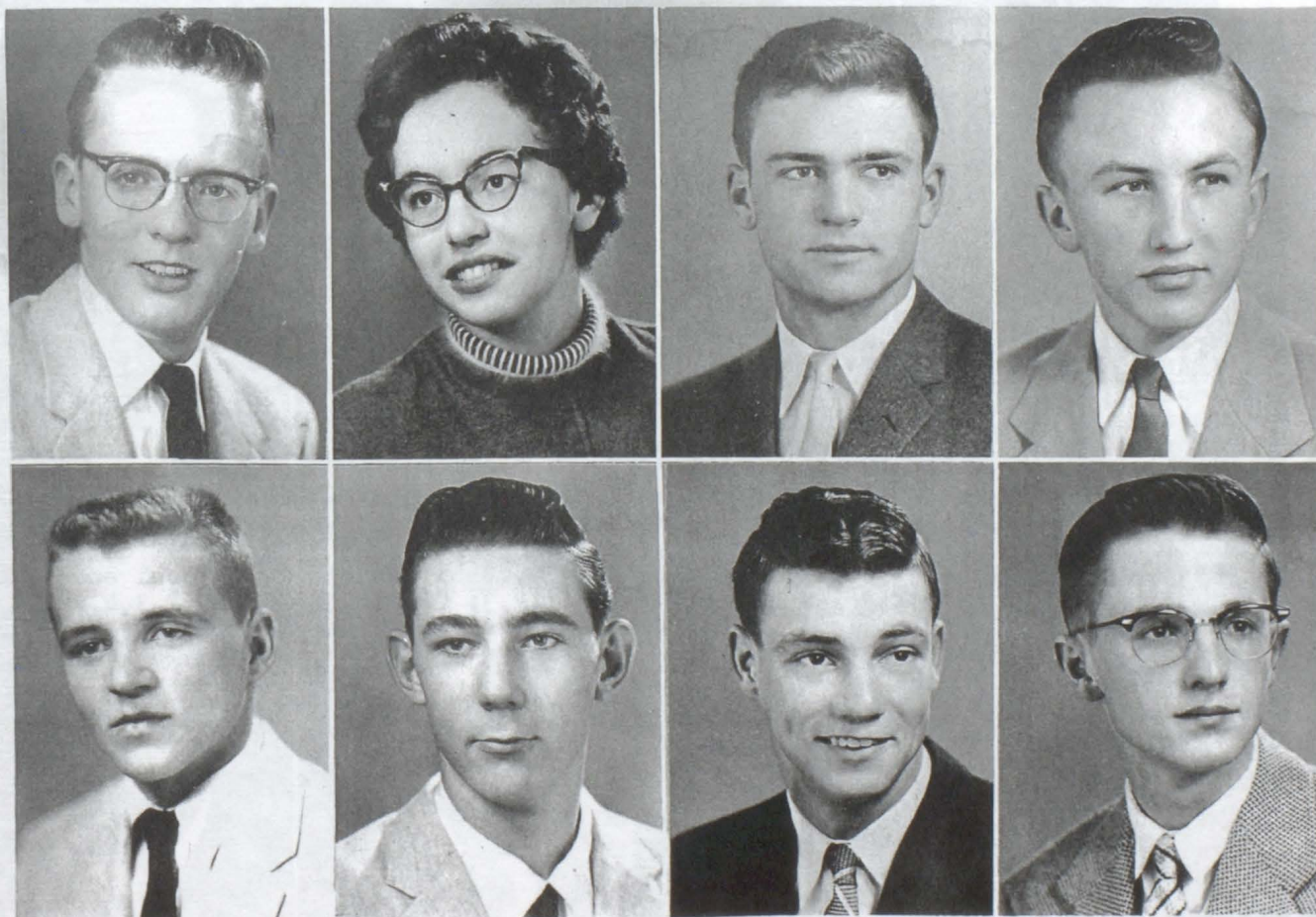

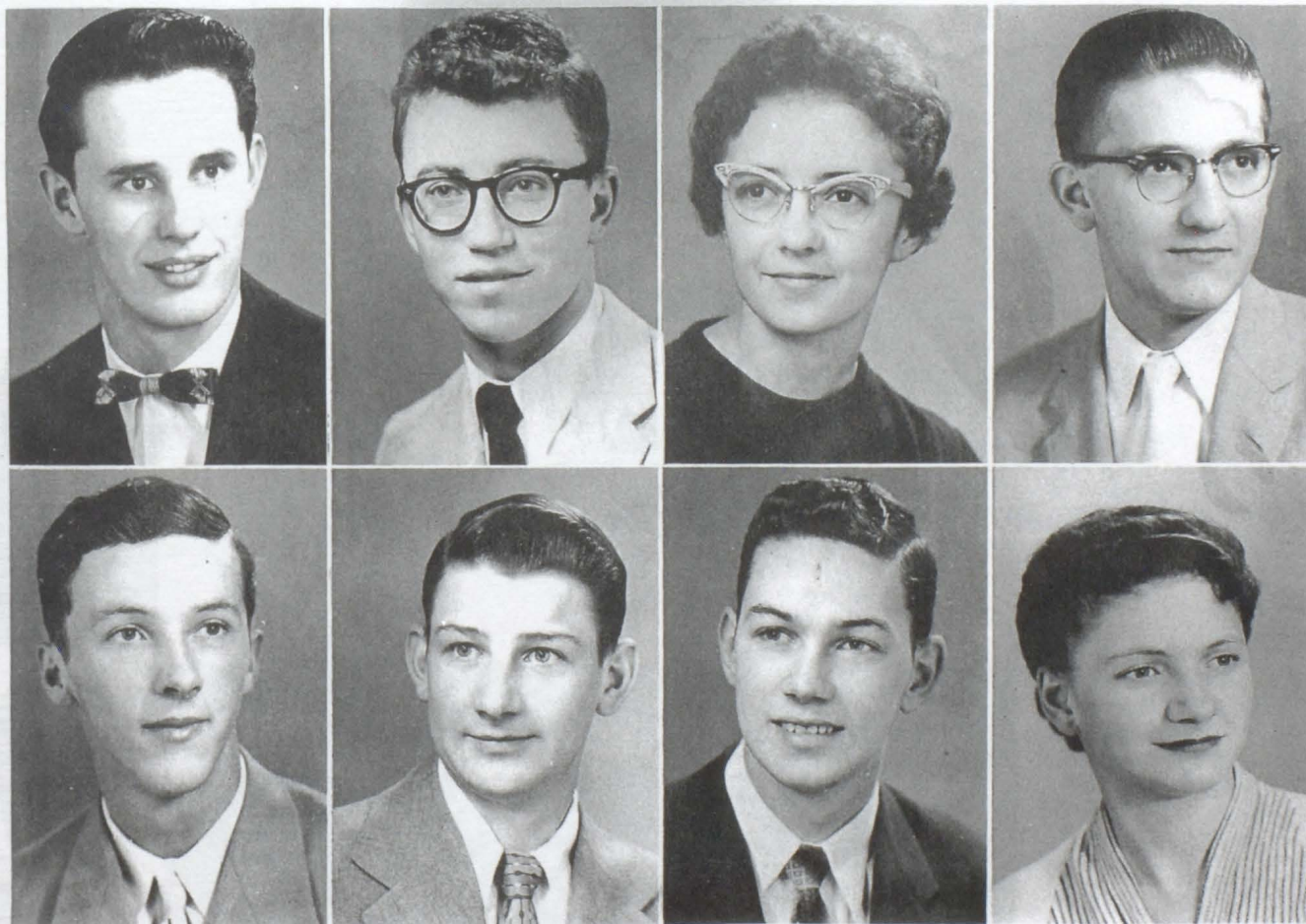
