


Finally Freshmen!






Most of the sophomores took accounting and said that the class was hard but they passed. Accounting became a required class this , meaning that all of the sophomores must take and pass it.




Class of 2002

Annual Staff



Band Loses Experienced Seniors, Gains Eager Freshmen





Student council kept busy with various activities. They had a fun and exciting year. They had meetings every month to plan and organize many different kinds of events.



Student council also held another Spring Fling. This included another dance and other activities that were similar to homecoming like Hush Day.







Leaders in Education and positive Attitude Development Teens Against Tobacco Use







The % was determined by the total places runners received in each race divided by the number of races in which they ran. 




























WAGNER HIGH SCHOOL WEIGHT LIFTING CLUBS






